During her lifetime, Coretta Scott King spoke courageously and eloquently in support of the civil rights of gays and lesbians. In 1996, she said, "I've always felt that homophobic attitudes and policies are unjust and unworthy of a free society and must be opposed by all Americans who believe in democracy." She went on to make it clear that she believed that had he lived, her husband would have joined in our struggle. She reminded her audience of Dr. King's wisdom. Speaking of the family of man, he said, "We are all tied together in a single garment of destiny... I can never be what I ought to be until you are allowed to be what you ought to be."

In recent months we have been reminded that the support, decency, and love of straight friends and allies have always been critical to each of us in our individual lives and in our community's ongoing struggle for full equality. One of our President's Award recipients elegantly embodies the noble ideal of unconditional love and support we receive from our straight allies. She is a regular at our Tuesday runs and dinners and volunteers enthusiastically at numerous events. Her bubbly personality and signature giggle add warmth to any space she occupies. Most importantly, she gives life to the reality that we really are all in this together. We really are wearing one single garment of destiny. In the days after the passage of Proposition 8, our community marched in the streets to make it clear that we would not accept the seats at the back of the bus. I was so proud to see so many Frontrunners adding their voices to the chorus. Over the last several months, I have received inspirational e-mails and heard moving testimonies from club members who have taken purposeful steps to further our struggle. understand the urgency of this moment. We clearly understand our responsibility to join the fight.

He carried the hopes and dreams of our community, the current and future marriages of many Los Angeles Frontrunners, some of them here in this room tonight.

> In the poem *Ulysses*, Alfred Lord Tennyson writes admiringly of the hero. After a long, epic 20 year journey, Ulysses returns home but quickly tires of the idle life of a king. He gathers his sailors and implores them to join him on one last adventure:

Come my friends,

'Tis not too late to seek a newer world...

...for my purpose holds

To sail beyond the sunset...

Tho' much is taken, much abides, and though We are not now that strength which in old days Moved earth and heaven; that which we are, we are; One equal temper of heroic hearts, Made weak by time and fate, but strong in will To strive, to seek, to find, and not to yield.

Our second President's Award recipient is at the forefront of the legal fight against Proposition 8. Like Tennyson's Ulysses, he reminds us--his friends--that it is not too late to seek a newer world as long as we remain strong in will and committed "to strive, to seek, to find, and not to yield."

Step Up Into the Past: LAFR Echo Park **Stairs Run**

Join us on Feb. 22 for a spectacular run/walk through the historic stairs of Echo Park.

ore than two-dozen public stairways cross the hillsides of Echo Park, concrete reminders of a neighborhood designed before the automobile became the dominant form of transportation. Many are small and practical in scale, rising only a few steps to provide a guick short cut to the next street or a secluded corner reachable only by stairs. But some, including the Laveta Terrace, Baxter and Clinton Stairs, are impressive and stylish landmarks that reward those who climb them with stunning views. In fact, at more than 230 steps, the Baxter Steps are perhaps the tallest in the city. While some stairs are rarely used, many provide the only access to the homes located along the steps and are of critical importance to numerous residents. But the historic details of the stairways—why some are grand and others utilitarian—and who determined their location, remains a mystery for the most part. (excerpt "Historic Echo Park" website).
